INTRODUCTION

The People's Review Legislative Accountability Project (LAP) Report aims to help Wyoming citizens understand some of the issues tackled and their legislators' decisions during the most recent legislative session. This LAP Report is a snapshot; we reference votes on only seven of the over 500 bills and resolutions filed during the 2025 Wyoming legislative general session.

As you peruse this LAP Report, remember that its purpose is to encourage you, the constituent, to **personally converse with your local Representative and Senator**. Simply knowing how a legislator voted does not always provide the why, which is a valuable part of the story, unveiled through a genuine conversation. An initial bill draft may change through the legislative process, with amendments hopefully improving the bill. Amendments can come up as legislators hear from the public, experts, organizations, and agencies about the consequences or benefits of implementation.

HOW MANY YEARS IN OFFICE

You will find one page for each legislator packed with information from votes they made and bills they sponsored to their contact information and the number of years they have served in the Wyoming Legislature.

Green bill number indicates we liked the bill.
Red bill number indicates we did not like the bill.

When legislators sponsor a bill, they publicly attach their name to the issue: demonstrating both ownership and a clear commitment to advancing the policy.

We highlight top individual and non-individual contributors to each legislator's last campaign, prioritizing PACs over political parties when both gave, regardless of amount, to reflect potential influence.

HOW TO USE



Now that the legislative session is over, legislators are back home and more accessible. Call them, email them, and meet with them. Another great way to connect with legislators is by **attending interim committee meetings** held across the state. These meetings offer a chance to observe the process and share your expertise through public testimony. As members of a citizen legislature, Wyoming lawmakers don't have individual staff; they rely on conversations with constituents, shared research, and public input to shape their decisions.

When having a conversation with legislators, remember the Wyoming Cowboy Code, especially: "Be tough, but fair" and "Talk less and say more." Approach conversations with respect and integrity, no matter how strongly you disagree or agree.

Our **legislators are elected to serve all their constituents**, not just those who agree with them. Each Representative and Senator brings a unique background and skillset which is enhanced by conversations, data, questions, and debate. Wyoming's legislative system requires public participation for good lawmaking.

Use this snapshot of options to help you, the constituent, start a meaningful conversation with your elected legislators.

Questions to Ask your Legislators:

- Could you explain your vote on [mention specific bill]?

- How do you stay informed about the issues that are important to our community?
- What is the most effective way for me to share my perspectives on upcoming legislation with you during the session?

BILL EXPLANATIONS

HB0249 - OPPOSE - DIED IN SENATE



This bill would have moved the primary to May, adding that if no candidate got over 50% of the vote a second primary election would have occurred in August - costing taxpayers at least \$2 million. Had it passed, it would have significantly changed the current primary process and could have hurt voter turnout while raising campaign costs.

SF0098 - OPPOSE - DIED IN HOUSE



This bill would have mandated that school board trustee candidates' political party affiliations be printed on general election ballots. Had it passed, it would have shifted the current nonpartisan election process to a partisan one.

SJ0002 - OPPOSE - DIED IN SENATE



This resolution would have demanded the transfer of federal public lands and subsurface rights to the State of Wyoming - except for Yellowstone National Park. As a resolution it would not have become law. However, had it passed, it would have urged the US Congress to take dangerous actions and threatened the integrity of public lands kept in public hands and managed by federal capabilities.

SF175 - OPPOSE - DIED IN HOUSE



This bill would have reduced the maximum unemployment insurance coverage by six weeks, effectively shortening the period during which unemployed workers can receive state unemployment assistance. Had it passed, it would have reduced a safeguard for people who live and seek to work in Wyoming.

HB0341 - SUPPORT - DIED IN HOUSE



This bill would have allowed Wyoming to join a federal program providing income-qualified children with \$120 in summer food assistance. Had it passed, the program, known as SUN Bucks, would have helped families buy groceries when school lunches aren't available

HB118 - OPPOSE - DIED IN SENATE WITHOUT A VOTE



This bill would have prevented land exchanges, conveyances, and sales between willing entities and the federal government based on a prohibition of net gain to public land. Had it passed, it would have infringed on private property rights, plus hindered opportunities for Wyoming to implement wildlife crossing infrastructure and other public projects.

SF0124 - OPPOSE - DIED IN SENATE



This bill would have created new criminal offenses for transporting or concealing unauthorized immigrants and mandate immigration status checks. Had it passed, it could have led to racial profiling, undermining community trust, and overburdening local law enforcement.

REPRESENTATIVE BILL ALLEMAND



On SF98 - voted to make school board races partisan, shifting the focus from individual candidate qualifications to party platforms by requiring political party labels on the general election ballot.



On HB249 - voted to spend \$2 million on a primary system that continues to exclude some Wyomingites from participating in the publicly funded primary election—one that determined 81% of legislators in 2024.



On HB118 - voted to restrict land exchanges, conveyances, and sales between willing private or state entities and the federal government, infringing on private property rights and future public projects.






